In November 1867, author George Eliot (signing herself as M. E. Lewes) wrote to Emily Davies, Founder of the College for Women: a beginning made on a small scale, she urged, would be a hindrance rather than a furtherance of the vision that would become Girton. An institution capable of transforming lives and changing the world needs 'A Great Campaign'.

Making a difference

Girton College, the UK's first residential institution for the higher education of women, was founded for inclusion. In 1869, the object was to allow women, irrespective of their background, to study on the same terms, to the same level, as men: the same subjects, the same ambition, the same exams (though women could not collect their degrees until 1948, only 15 years before I came up). Today, Girton has been enriched by the admission of men, but the principle of inclusion is still what drives us on. The aim is to enable a diverse mix of young people from all walks of life to take up their place at Girton, regardless of background, identity, or financial means.

Now, as in the past, some students need more financial support than others. Fortunately, just as the principle of inclusive excellence threads through Girton's history, so too does the power of philanthropy.

The success of A Great Campaign is testimony to the generosity of Girtonians like you. As the Mistress



often notes, quoting Emily Davies, 'It has taken all of us to get so far.'
However, it is also true that the Mistress herself has made it rather difficult for all of us not to join in. Saying 'no' to Susan is well-nigh impossible. So let us all thank her too for her leadership of both our Campaign and our College, and wish her an equally successful future when she steps down in September.

A Great Campaign

The first words that came to mind when I saw the bottom line were 'Girton, you've got this!' Over 50 million pounds split between cash gifts and legacy pledges is a game-changing amount, that will help re-endow our College and propel it into a new era.

Barely 150 years ago Girton was founded on a shoestring: long on determination, but short, very short, on cash. It was a precarious existence, spending down, hand to mouth, from myriad small gifts – a spirited approach with tremendous buy-in, but a far cry from the firm financial fortunes of the long-established men's Colleges. In fact, Girton had no permanent endowment at all until 1913. Nearly a century later, we were still nowhere in the investments league, and still struggling to recover from the global financial crisis.

It was clear what we had to do. Grow the permanent endowment! A Great Campaign was the central plank. But could we persuade our supporters to buy into an enduring solution rather than a quick fix? Could

we hold our own nerve as reserves took a hit while the endowment expanded? The answer, thanks to you, is 'yes'. Indeed, because of your vision, generosity, and unwavering good faith, we have exceeded our wildest dreams.

Today the permanent endowment stands at over £71 million, there is a healthy reserve of just over £32 million, and we are finally on course for the budget to break even. A Great Campaign is not the only driver: our diverse well-managed (nearly fully divested) portfolio has been well stewarded to yield good returns, and the Council has made some wise decisions to restructure the estate. But A Great Campaign – your Campaign – was the inspiration, the momentum, and the catalyst for it all.

The best thing about this? To quote the remarkable Emily Davies: 'It has taken all of us to get so far'. And as we look to the next horizon, may I encourage you to remember, too, what she said next: 'it' – our College – 'wants us all, still!'

Where excellence thrives – your visionary donations to our endowment campaign have paved the way to a financially sustainable future



Securing a financially sustainable future for the College was the overarching aim of A Great Campaign. and it is thanks to your generous support that the College's finances have been transformed for the better.


Over 78% of the £28.4 million received during A Great Campaign has been donated to the College's permanent endowment capital, which grew from £22 million to £71 million. Our restricted endowment (the funds which have a designated purpose, such as those that support our bursaries or our Fellowships) grew from £18 million to £49 million; unrestricted permanent endowment capital rose from under £4 million to £22 million.

By completing our Great Campaign you have helped boost Girton's annual income from £880.000 to £2.84 million (using the 2010-2021 spending rule): a game-changing uplift.

This has moved us from the position from 'living hand to mouth'- having to fundraise for that year's needsto having an investment income that allows us to plan for the future.

With the real cost of a Cambridge education estimated to be double the income from student fees, this uplift is vital. It will continue to improve our academic excellence. And of course, the capital of your generous gifts remains unspent, ensuring that this support will continue to help the College respond to whatever the future might bring.

Compared to other Cambridge Colleges the size of our endowment has moved from the bottom third to the middle.



• It supports all aspects of College life, including those Fellowships and bursaries that are not supported by their own designated funds, and the maintenance of our Grade II listed buildings, including a wing refurbishment most years, the running costs of our buildings. and the maintenance of our extensive gardens and grounds.

 The growth in our unrestricted endowment helped us to stay afloat during the Covid-19 pandemic,

despite a considerable loss in financial income from summer programmes, conferences, and rent. We were able to run essential services for students and protect staff from redundancies.

Gifts in Wills have had a vital role to play in transforming the College's

finances, contributing over £13 million to the £28 million received


during A Great Campaign. In many cases these gifts have been left

without restrictions, allowing Girton to support whatever needs arise.

Why are we raising funds for the endowment?

Most of our priority funds are endowment funds. This means that the capital of the fund is not spent. Instead, part of the investment return generated by the capital in the fund is spent on the area of College life supported by the fund. The other part is re-invested to protect the capital. helping to ensure that the original funds keep pace with inflation. Once a specific fund (e.g. a bursary, or a postgraduate scholarship) is endowed, then that fund will always be there to help future generations of Girton students and Fellows.

Since its Foundation. Girton has opened its doors to people with exceptional academic talent, from all backgrounds and circumstances, to give them a remarkable and rare educational opportunity. This is our College's founding principle. For Girton to remain truly diverse and offer a transformational educational opportunity to all those who qualify for a place here, the College must be able to provide financial assistance to

those who need it. On average one in four of our undergraduates would be unable to afford university without the support that a cost-of-living bursary provides, though not all receive a full bursary. This is why it is so fantastic that 32 bursaries of up to £3,500 each year have been fully funded in perpetuity, enabling a succession of students to accept their place at Girton and take full advantage of everything a Cambridge education has to offer.

Class Gifts

During the second half of A Great Campaign a fantastic new initiative began - the Class Bursary Gift. So far 10 year-groups have come together to start funding their own undergraduate bursary, and seven bursaries have been completed. Class Champion Wendy Holden explains why she got involved:

Hardship and Wellbeing Grants

40 additional grants endowed, which have helped students in a variety of circumstances, including support for travel for family emergencies, to cover unexpected, significant expenses (such as replacing a stolen bike or repairing a broken laptop), to help meet the costs of joining College societies and activities or the costs of short-term mental health counselling.

Where originality thrives – your enlightened support has endowed 10 partial postgraduate scholarships

Girton is committed to extending our foundational values of inclusion and equality, together with academic excellence, to our postgraduate students. The opportunity to study for a postgraduate degree at Cambridge needs to be available to the most talented students in order for original, ground-breaking research to take place. There is a global demand from businesses to academia for talented scholars with higher degrees which is one of the reasons why we have decided to grow our postgraduate numbers. Yet funding for postgraduate

education for both UK and International students is limited so it was a key aim of A Great Campaign to offer more funding in the way of scholarships.

We are delighted that, thanks to the generosity of alumni, 10 partial postgraduate scholarships have been endowed. This will enable more talented scholars (including some of our own undergraduates) to embrace the challenge of completing a higher degree in Cambridge and at Girton, further their careers and create a better world.

Small group teaching, by researchers at the cutting edge, is at the very heart of what we do. Our Fellows nurture, and inspire our students to explore, and question, their subject to the full, encouraging them to bring their own ideas to the discussion. Thanks to your generous support we have been able to complete the endowment of 13 Teaching and Research Fellowships, many of which have been named to celebrate some of the most inspirational teachers and researchers in Girton's recent past and some of our most generous donors. These endowed Fellowships

will ensure that there will be teaching in all key subjects at Girton, both for today's students and also for generations of students to come.

So many of you have given to support our Fellowships, responding to the challenge of an incredible gift of £2.5 million of matched funding that galvanised this campaign. Well over £8 million has been received in A Great Campaign to support our Fellowships, from major gifts to smaller monthly donations, to Gifts in Wills, including an exceptional bequest.

- your imaginative gifts provide an allround residential educational experience

An inspiring living and learning environment, with flourishing gardens, extensive grounds, and opportunities to take part in the arts, music, and sport, were very much part of the vision Emily Davies had for Girton over 150 years ago. Thanks to your generous support, the estate has been transformed and the principles of an all-round residential education hugely enhanced. There are now 375 en-suite study bedrooms for students (in Ash Court and at Swirles Court) including more disabled access rooms, and we have re-landscaped Campbell Court into an oasis of calm beside the Library, Archive and Chapel. The heritage Orchard has been revitalised, the much-loved Honeysuckle and Nut walk replanted, and our comprehensive on-site sports facilities greatly improved. A new Artist-in-Residence Scheme, together with a Science-into-Arts-Residency.

has enhanced the College collections and thoroughly engaged our students in the creation and appreciation of artworks both in person and online. The same is true of prizes that celebrate poetry, awards that support music performance, and gifts that enable the choir to travel internationally and within the UK, while singing regularly in College. You also helped fund the science and humanities communication prizes, travel, and sports awards, and created a host of other opportunities to enable all students, regardless of their financial circumstances, to take advantage of the unique all-round education that Girton offers. You have helped us create a home and a caring community for our students while expanding their experiences and horizons; you have enabled us truly to deliver everything that is good for body, soul, and spirit.


